

LEXI ATTENDS BRENTWOOD ACADEMY WHERE SHE PLAYS BOTH SOFTBALL AND VOLLEYBALL. SHE ALSO PLAYS FOR THE NATIONALLY RANKED CLUB PROGRAM, THE BIRMINGHAM THUNDERBOLTS OUT OF ALABAMA.

THE MISSION

Health Disparity Reduction Hearing Loss

Disparities in pediatric health care quality and access are documented throughout time in literature and journal articles. Research and knowledge of such issues, specifically pediatric hearing loss, provide concrete data that underserved populations have alarming percentages of untreated children.

The issues associated with untreated hearing loss in children can have devastating results on a child's life. Vulnerable populations are particularly burdened due to the socioeconomic barriers they already face. Children from certain geographic regions or ethnic backgrounds are particularly burdened with untreated hearing loss. Their parents face issues such as little to no access to care, affordability issues and they lack the understanding or urgency to get the child treatment.

There is also a population of families who are aware of the child's hearing loss, yet fail to act at alarming rates. 50% of children who fail a newborn hearing screening do not return to for follow up testing. When parents know there is hearing loss and already have an awareness, history shows that social movements help increase their response time.

For years, there has been an abundance of research on the issues associated with pediatric hearing loss, however very little changes to the approach to serve these vulnerable populations. Songs for Sound has built a proven sustainable Quality Improvement model for underserved children with untreated hearing loss.

Songs for Sound's program delivers a full-circle approach. We believe through outreach, advocacy and lifetime support, we can continue to greatly decrease untreated hearing loss in children and increase outcomes in areas listed below:

The child faces issues such as:

- low literacy rates
- language competence
- cognitive development
- social-emotional well-being
- · academic achievement

Three out of four parents of children with hearing loss reported common problem areas including:

- Social skills (52%)
- Speech and language development (51%)
- Grades in school (50%)
- Emotional health (42%)

- Relationships with peers (38%)
- Self-esteem (37%)
- Relationships with family (36%)

More information on untreated pediatric hearing loss:

- Disparities in pediatric health care quality are well described in the literature, yet practical approaches to decreasing them remain elusive.
- There are significant disparities in care facing children with hearing loss. The objective is to assess the current disparities in pediatric hearing healthcare delivery, overcome the barriers of efficient and effective pediatric hearing health care, and deliver the innovations to improve pediatric hearing healthcare delivery.
- Children with hearing loss from certain geographic regions or ethnic background are significantly delayed in diagnosis and treatment. Multiple patient characteristics (presentation of hearing loss), parental factors (insurance status, socioeconomic status, educational status, and travel distance to providers), and provider barriers (specialist shortage and primary care provider challenges) prevent the delivery of timely hearing health care. Advances, such as improved screening programs and the expansion of care through remote services, may help to ameliorate these disparities.
- Timely identification and treatment of pediatric hearing loss is critical to prevent lifelong language complications. Children from vulnerable populations, such as rural residents, face significant disparities in care. Careful assessment of these barriers and implementation of culturally acceptable interventions are paramount to maximize communication outcomes of children with hearing loss.
- Social movements in public health have also long been organized around the pressing needs of vulnerable populations.

CONCLUSION

- 1. We provide access and intervention through our massive, nationwide mobile hearing health outreach program, The Hear the Music Project, which includes free hearing screenings aboard an experience.
- 2. The Hear the Music Project is a social movement & experience designed to change human behaviors by removing stigmas associated with hearing loss and hearing technologies. The outreach model and "hear the music" message provides an opportunity for children and families to be a part of a larger movement.

- 3. Our Care Team of advocates help meet families where they are, supporting them at every phase of the process to treatment and even post treatment. The Care Team meets the family where they are and increases awareness, makes the appointment, review their insurance plan, coordinates the right audiologist match for the family's preferences.
- 4. Hope Lifetime Programs provides virtual and in-person programs to help create sustainable outcomes and support the family once the child is in a hearing device. Support includes:
- academic
- athletic
- social

Hope Lifetime Programs also supports families whose child is already in hearing devices.







Our tour and kiosk strategy provides a person an opportunity to test at their convenience without the hassle of an appointment.



II. CARE TEAM RELATIONSHIPS

Our Care Team approach is focused on building relationships and trust with each individual. After the test, we provide one on one support, counseling and an advocate to walk consumers to hearing life again.



III. Hope Lifetime Programs LIFETIME SUPPORT

With funding, we are hosting gatherings and events for children with hearing technology. These are both social and educational to support children with hearing technology for a lifetime.

THE DETAILS





- SFS serves MNPS/CHARTER SCHOOL SITES with SFS Hear the Music program
- Staff & Students are screened either aboard the clinic or inside of quiet rooms; our technology and kiosks are mobile.
- Pending an approval of a grant, each test site receives a stand alone "Hear the Music Program Kiosk"
- Each student/their family and staff person moves into our Care Team which provides follow up and support for next steps. This is personalized support for anyone who needs additional services (audiology, hearing technology, speech, etc).
- Each student/staff gets lifetime support from our Hope Lifetime Programs - programs (in-person/virtual) to be successful with their hearing technology for a lifetime. Social, Academic and Athletic support programs for people living with hearing loss.
- Prep for each school to have a Hear the Music Day/Event in 2022
 WE SUCCESSFULLY EXECUTED THIS AT AMQUI ELEM. IT WAS VERY IMPACTFUL.
- With funding, we are hiring, have identified, a full-time Director of Audiology to oversee the Care Team and audiological support.
